

Sermon Title: True HaMashiach Consciousness: Aligning with the Heart of Jesus

Opening Prayer:

Introduction: The Modern Pursuit of Wealth and Power

Many young people today, especially in the Black community and beyond, are embracing a mindset that equates material success and power with spiritual enlightenment, often labeling it "HaMashiach consciousness." While the desire for self-improvement and empowerment is not inherently wrong, defining it in these terms creates a contradiction with the life and teachings of Jesus.

True HaMashiach consciousness is not about elevating oneself or accumulating wealth; it's about aligning our minds, hearts, and actions with Jesus' character, values, and mission.

1. What is True HaMashiach Consciousness?

HaMashiach's Mindset: Humility and Service

- Philippians 2:5-8:
